I am not an easily impressed person. I have to hand it to you. You, your entire organization and especially Barbara and Neil are superb. I will continue to work closely with Panayotis and hope that one day soon we will have a totally accessible open sea sailing boat in the Greek waters.

## Sailability Thessaloniki – Panayotis Tsinganos 5th & 6th July, 2003

In Thessaloniki, the venue is great. Everyone who came and went sailing on the first day, came again on Sunday asking for more.

We experienced some great moments: Thomai is a friend of mine and mother of two sons and a daughter. The first boy, Kostas 16, has a disability. The second, Stavros 13, with some sailing experience with Optimists and, Marina she is 6. Kostas' disability causes some tension within the family.

You should have been there to see their mother's excitement, as she saw her two boys sailing together a double 2.3. Then, little Marina went sailing, as did both the parents. Now, Thomai is the best contact that we have in Thessaloniki. She will help forming Sailability Thessaloniki as a branch of



Sailability Hellas and is even considering to buy a Access Dinghy for her son. He keeps asking her every day: "Mom, when shall we go sailing again?"

We met Vassilis Iliopoulos. He is a sailing trainer, and helped us with the rubber boat on Saturday. He is a great guy and will help us. Unfortunately, we had had a few unexpected problems. To name a few:

1. The president of the club (he was my only contact) was in Athens, accompanying the team to a regatta.
2. First day (Saturday) it was one of hottest this summer. Due to the excessive heat, quite a few people left at 2pm. and other people did not come at all, due to the excessive heat.
3. It was on July, so a lot of kids were away to summer vacations with grandparents. If it was one week before, we could have more than 60 kids with mental disabilities, who were now in a camp.

The best part of the demos in Thessaloniki: the double 2.3 and 303 needed a person who can sail to be with someone who cannot. In Athens, Neil and Barbara did this. In Thessaloniki, two Optimists' kids did all the job, both of the days; Neil and Barbara did not even get into Access Dinghies. And the boys were so happy doing it. It was hard to believe !

## Access Dinghies set sail for Athens— Arriving mid August 2003

On Monday 14th August a container left the Access Dinghy factory in Melbourne heading for Athens. This unit will become the basis for the eagerly anticipated activities of Sailability Athens.

Thanks to the generous sponsors of Ronstan International, RWB Marine, West Marine, Henri-Lloyd, Skandia and P&O Nedlloyd the following equipment is being sent to Athens:

- 1 x Access Liberty, with servo assist steering
- 2 x 303 wide seater sailing dinghies
- 1 x 2.3 single with servo assist controls
- 1 x 2.3 wide seat sailing dinghy
- 1 x C Crane for safe transferring of sailors
- 1 x keel caddy to transport ballasted centreboards
- 1 x custom built boat trailer to carry 5 Access Dinghies

Currently Sailability Hellas is being incorporated with two branches—Athens and Thessaloniki. While the Athens equipment will enable the programme to begin in September, Thessaloniki will need to wait a little longer while another four sponsors are sought.

So far the sponsors for Thessaloniki are the Melbourne City Council and the Greek Community of Wollongong. In August, the Greek community in Wollongong will hold a fundraiser event to raise funds for Sailability Thessaloniki. Also in August, the Lord Mayor of Melbourne, John So, will present a cheque for \$7,000 to the Access Dinghy Foundation.

Celebrating the 20th anniversary of Melbourne and Thessaloniki's sister relationship, the Melbourne City Council is keen to assist the Access Dinghy Foundation to present Sailability to the community of Thessaloniki.

Perhaps the Greek business community in Melbourne will take up the challenge and become sponsors for Thessaloniki.
